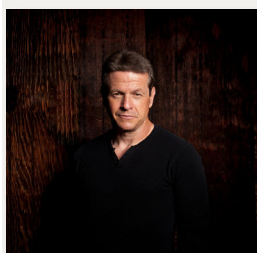

Journey Home: The First USS Enterprise Model

The original model of the USS Enterprise from "Star Trek" has been returned to Gene Roddenberry's son, Eugene "Rod" Roddenberry, several decades after it went missing. Lost in the 1970s, the model resurfaced on eBay last year, leading to its withdrawal from sale and subsequent verification by Heritage Auctions, Dallas. The model was eventually authenticated in their Beverly Hills office after being found in a storage unit.

Rod Roddenberry, now CEO of Roddenberry Entertainment, expressed his intention not to keep the model as a personal memento but to restore and display it publicly, hoping it will be featured in a museum. The model is historically significant, used in the original pilot and opening credits of "Star Trek," and served as a prototype for the larger version displayed in the Smithsonian.

Heritage Auctions described the model as "priceless," emphasizing its potential high auction value and iconic

status within the "Star Trek" universe and broader pop culture. Rod Roddenberry recalled limited memories of the model from his youth and humorously dismissed rumors of its destruction in a childhood incident. The return marks a significant moment in preserving and celebrating "Star Trek" history.

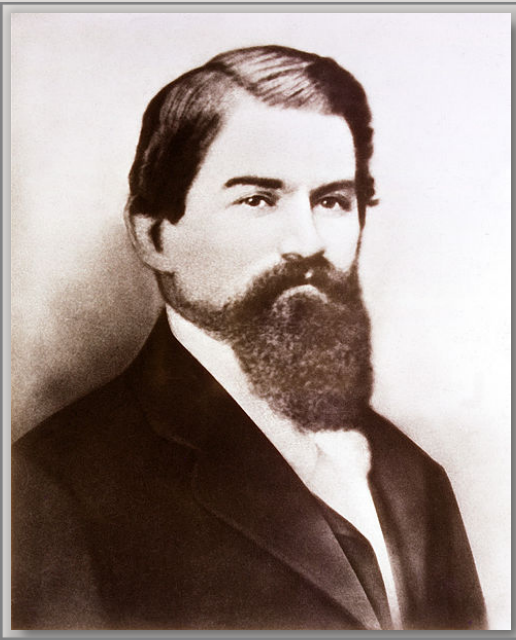

What They Didn't Tell You



In post-Civil War America, a certain pharmacist in Atlanta was blending up concoctions not in a grand laboratory, but in his own basement. He was not a doctor, though his products bore the title "Dr." on their labels. John Pemberton knew the impact of a title for selling his medicinal syrups.

Operating in an era when a local pharmacist might rival the knowledge of national drug producers, Pemberton concocted elixirs like "Dr. Pemberton's Globe of Flower Cough Syrup" and "Dr. Pemberton's Extract of Sty'linger Blood Medicine," promising cures for various ailments. Yet, his signature invention was yet to come, born under circumstances as unexpected as they were fortuitous.

Seeking a non-alcoholic alternative to the popular patent medicines of his time—which were typically laced with alcohol—Pemberton started experimenting with unique ingredients. His focus? A mixture containing

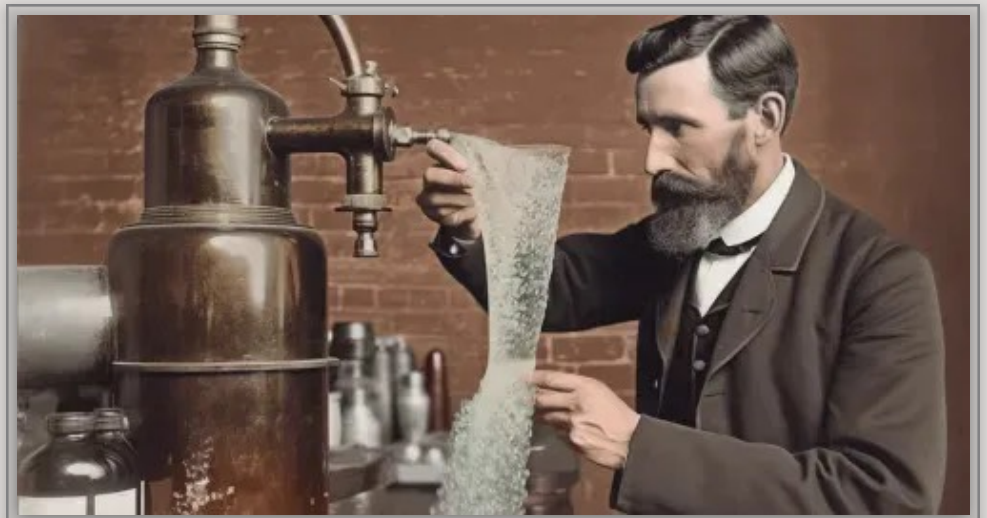
caffeine to stimulate the senses and, somewhat controversially, a bit of cocaine for its pain-relieving properties. Perhaps he aimed to cure headaches, or maybe even to provide relief from the hangovers caused by other less savory tonics.

In the summer of 1886, this pursuit led him to create a new syrup that he decided to take to Jacobs' Pharmacy, one of the most respected drug stores in Atlanta. There, he suggested they mix it with water as a medicinal tonic. The sales were modest until a serendipitous error occurred—a novice clerk, not entirely familiar with the concoction, used carbonated water instead of still. This mistake transformed Pemberton's syrup into a fizzy beverage that quickly caught the public's fancy.

The new drink was an immediate hit, offering a refreshing fizz that was unlike anything else at the time. It rapidly gained popularity and was soon being sold regularly at the pharmacy. Despite its burgeoning success, Pemberton's health declined, and he never fully witnessed the global empire that his invention would spawn. He sold his share in the venture for a mere \$2,000.

The drink, created from a simple pharmacist's error and a twist of fate, expanded beyond the boundaries of Atlanta, spreading across the United States and eventually around the world. That drink, which started as a medicinal tonic, is now known universally as Coca-Cola.

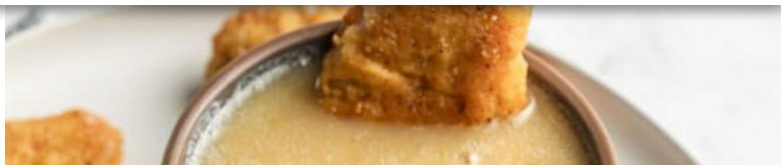

Almond Crusted Chicken Bites with Honey Mustard Dip

Ingredients

1lb chicken breast, cubed
1/2 cup ground almonds
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1 tbsp Dijon mustard
1 tbsp honey
1 tbsp olive oil
Fresh parsley for garnish

Instructions

Preheat oven to 400°F (200°C). In a bowl, mix ground almonds, Parmesan, salt, and pepper. Coat chicken cubes in the almond mixture. Arrange on a baking sheet and drizzle with olive oil. Bake for 20-25 minutes until golden.

For the dip: Combine honey and Dijon mustard in a saucepan. Warm over low heat, stirring until smooth. Let it cool before serving. Serve the almond-crusted chicken bites with the honey mustard dip and garnished with chopped parsley.
